(Concurrent Sessions)

A-1 Undocumented Citizen - Who Am I, Really?

This workshop explores several views of life identity for foster children and adoptees. Awareness and Advocacy: Simple activities that are necessary to conduct life can sometimes be a point of anxiety for adoptees and foster children. To get a birth certificate, permission to vacation, even seeing a doctor can be a full ordeal. This workshop will be exposure to these challenges and discuss current and needed legislation to help current youth and alumni of the system have the dignity of their true identity. *Presented by: Gina Surgeon, Executive Director - Positive FACE, Atlanta GA*

A-2 Trauma Informed Interventions

When we understand our fundamental processes that underlie traumatic stress, it opens the door to an array of interventions. Participants will learn right brain intervention strategies for youth in child welfare, as it relates to their trauma/attachment, and key principles of self-regulation. Participants will learn how to help children experiencing "blocked trust", build connections and heal from interpersonal trauma, while still maintaining routine, structure, and limit setting. The importance of considering the child's history from his/her point of view, and helping them stay in their window of tolerance. *Presented by: Graham Perkovich, Child Welfare Trainer - Sunshine Health, Coral Springs, FL*

A-3 FASD And Drug Exposure In Utero

The purpose of this training is to provide current, intellectually accessible and useful information on Drug Use in utero and Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS)/ Spectrum Disorders (FASD) to support professionals, kinship, adoptive and foster parents, increase understanding of in utero substance exposure, reduce frustration, expand the range of effective parenting and classroom interventions, and provide a foundation for parents and professionals to collaborate in an effort to meet the needs of the children/youth. More than 50% of pregnant women take prescription or nonprescription (over-the-counter) drugs or use social drugs (such as tobacco and alcohol) or illicit drugs at some time during pregnancy and use of drugs during pregnancy is increasing. In general, drugs should not be used during pregnancy unless absolutely necessary because many can harm the fetus. About 2 to 3% of all birth defects result from drugs that are taken to treat a disorder or symptom. Identifying FASD as a brain-based disorder provides an organizing principle, an alternative explanatory theoretical foundation for understanding the meaning of behaviors. It starts with the idea that brain function equals behaviors which reframes the meaning of some behaviors from "won't" to "can't". A-4 Foster Children's Speaking And Listening Skills

The workshop will be aimed at educating those that work with foster children: child welfare agency workers, educators, foster parents etc. about the common challenges that foster children experience in the area of their communication which often leads to a breakdown in communication that culminates in them moving from foster home to foster home and from school to school, the reasons behind these challenges (for example, the impact of trauma on the amygdala) on what can be

done to help to improve their spoken and written and emotional literacy. *Presented by: Sylvia Ikomi, Educator - The University of Greenwich, London, England*

A-5 Parenting In Oz!: Trauma Informed Parenting - Part 1 (This is a 3 part series)

"Parenting In OZ!" provides the tools needed to heal the trauma that underlies children's "misbehaviors". When the underlying stress and trauma is addressed, the behaviors will change and our children will heal. OZ is an entertaining and multi-sensory approach to learning about trauma. It uses the colorful imagery of the Wizard of OZ to help parents visualize the ever-present fears at the core of childhood trauma. This training will give you the imagery and vocabulary to understand trauma at the deepest level --and you will be able to remember it. *Presented by: Rolf Van Leeuwen, Former Foster Parent And Adoptive Parent & Director of Adoption & Permanency - Alternative Family Services, Santa Rosa, CA*

A-6 Connections: Relationships Driving Youth Success

B-1 Supporting All Students Through The FAFSA And Financial Aid Process

In order to prepare foster youth, homeless students, and all independent students to complete the FAFSA form, it is critical to understand the barriers that exist, the support needed, and the resources available to help them navigate the financial aid process. This session will highlight the federal support available to students in various special circumstances. Participants will receive federal updates, information on the new MyStudentAid mobile app, and an overview of the Financial Aid Toolkit. B-2 Trust Based Relational Intervention Workshop

The goals of Trust Based Relational Intervention (TBRI) are to lay the foundation for deep insight about the impact of a child's history on their long-term development and to create a framework for practical intervention and application, and lastly to enhance understanding about how to interpret behavior and to respond appropriately. Trust Based Relational Intervention is a holistic approach for helping children who come from hard places, such as maltreatment, abuse, neglect, violence, prenatal and post-natal experiences as well as medical and relational trauma. Parents and professionals are often confused. This session will provide participants with insight and strategies for addressing behaviors that result from trauma & hard places. *Presented by: Connie Pierre-Antoine, CEO and Founder - Genesis Family Enrichment Center, Inc, Gainesville, FL*

B-3 Brains, Behavior And Regulation

Our experiences and relationships have all laid a foundation to how we react

and respond to a variety of situations and experiences. When trauma is woven into these experiences and interactions, our behaviors may become inappropriate or "maladaptive." Parenting is stressful enough, but when you add a child or youth to the mix with a trauma history, the day to day life can be downright exhausting. This session will take a more in depth look at the trauma behind the behaviors, uncover the function of these behaviors (there is a function to every behavior!) and how caregivers can begin the process of responding to our children from a trauma sensitive perspective! *Presented by: Denise Rice, MSW, LCSW, ACSW, LAC/LAT, Trainer, Therapist, Consultant - HOPEful Healing Training and Consulting, LLC, Rawlins, WY*

B-4 Beneath The Surface- Attachment And Trauma's Relationship To Human Trafficking

This training provides an overview of human trafficking, including statistics, laws and processes. Thorough attention is given to the impact human trafficking has on the survivor's functioning in relationships and subsequent attachment challenges. The training will: examine childhood adversities and their risks; review trauma bonding and its connection to attachment; discuss protective and risk factors; and examine supportive treatment protocols. *Presented by: Heather Ford, Child Welfare Clinical Trainer - Sunshine Health, Wesley Chapel, FL*

B-5 Parenting In Oz!: Trauma Informed Parenting - Part 2 (This is a 3 part series)

B-6 Trauma Stewardship In Foster Care: Self-Care While Caring For Children

Secondary trauma is an inherent reality for parents and professionals exposed to the painful experiences of children and youth. Self-awareness and self-care are critical for avoiding foster care-related compassion fatigue. This interactive workshop addresses: (a) recognizing and responding to trauma-reactive behavior in children and youth in care; (b) sources of vicarious trauma for

caregivers and professionals; (c) early warning signs of secondary traumatic stress; and (d) compassion fatigue prevention and safety planning for effective self-care. C-1 Tools & Resources To Help Build Awareness For National Foster Care Month

Child Welfare Information Gateway is the information service of the Children's Bureau. It connects professionals to resources to protect children and strengthen families. In this presentation Dr. Riley will discuss PTSD in depth. This talk will cover the epidemiology and symptoms. E-1 Using Hip Hop And Pop Culture To Teach Life Skills

For children with mental health needs, psychotropic medications may be effective treatments. However, these medications can have serious side effects and should be used in

conjunction with treatment planning mechanisms and effective medication monitoring. Treatment planning is critical to enhance continuity of care; improving coordination of services between health and child welfare professionals. Effective medication monitoring can reduce the risk of inappropriate dosing and inappropriate medication combinations.
