Justin is a graduate from Western Michigan University from Detroit, Michigan. As an author and business owner with his wife Alexis, they joined the Forbes Next 1000 class in 2021. Together, they've published an award-winning, bestselling book titled Redefining Normal: How Two Foster Kids Beat The Odds and Discovered Healing, Happiness and Love that has impacted over 25,000 individuals and families.

Discussion will include strategies and techniques developed by foster care alumni, Justin and Alexis, as they combined the information they've learned from healthy foster parents, counselors, advocates, and ultimately their lived experience. A-3 Collaboration is Key When Managing a Client With Mental Health Needs While Balancing Your Own Location: Discovery

The unique experiences and stressors from working in the Child Welfare Legal System are exacerbated when dealing with clients with mental health issues. Clients may run hot or cold, high and low, call often or not at all. They may seem difficult, argumentative, even hostile or be passive aggressive, withdrawn, dishonest. Some are in treatment, on medication: some are not. This level of work stress is difficult to manage under normal circumstances; but dealing with a client that has mental health needs that may not be being properly managed takes extra time, professionalism, patience, and will often throw off your sense of balance and calm. This seminar explores the legal requirements under Chapter 39 to identify/determine when mental health is in controversy and offers effective stress management tools & techniques to maintain your balance while advising clients on how to effectively navigate the dependency process and maintain positive relationships case managers, social workers, Child Protective Investigators, Guardians ad Litem, the Court, caregivers, and their children. Afterall, isn't the goal a safe reunification?

B-1 Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders From A Trauma Lens (Part 1 of 2)

Location: Discovery

We are seeing high rates of children who have been prenatally exposed to alcohol, drugs and high levels of in-utero stress which can have a significant impact on the individual's brain development. Although Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) are twice as common as autism, this disorder often goes undiagnosed or misdiagnosed. Children, adolescents and adults with an FASD have invisible brain injuries and typical parenting, teaching and therapeutic strategies are often ineffective. It is vital for anyone parenting, teaching or working with these individuals to understand the reasons behind the learning and behavioral challenges and to have an indepth understanding of the strategies which are more effective with these neurobehavioral differences. *Presented by: Barb Clark, Training Specialist - North American Council on Adoptable Children (NACAC), St Paul, MN*

B-2 Mental Illness Within The Foster Care System Location: Expedition

C-2 College Resources for Students Coming from Texas Foster Care Location: Voyage

The Texas Education and Training Voucher is a Federal fund put in place to help aged-out youth from foster care with living expenses while attending postsecondary school. House Bill 2537 went into effect 6/9/2017 and it requires high school counselors in Texas to inform students in foster care about their postsecondary school benefits every year. This workshop will outline post-

C-3 Showing Up as your Authentic Self for Youth Workers

Location: Expedition

The Youth Support Partner Unit (YSP Unit) in Allegheny County pairs peer mentors with lived system experience with young adults currently involved in childserving systems. Using the expertise and experience of our staff, this presentation will focus on how youth workers are capable of building strong, authentic relationships with youth by simply showing up as their authentic selves. This presentation will start with an icebreaker activity focused on being authentic. The presentation will then feature different barriers and stigmas that exist for youth in care and how these factors can hinder the development of strong relationships between caregivers and the youth. We will then share 8 ways youth workers are damaging their relationships with youth at their first meeting. Next, we will dive into how the average youth worker is able to promote healing practices through relationship building. The presentation will also consider what it means to be authentic and why authenticity is so important to youth in care. The presentation will end with a discussion on how youth workers can help empower youth to create their own healthy and authentic relationships,



including setting boundaries with others.
