

D-1 ETV And College Resources For Students With Foster Care Experience Location: Voyage

The Texas Education and Training Voucher (ETV) is a federal fund put in place to assist students coming from foster care with living expenses while attending post-secondary school. D-2 Why Do They Do That: Understanding The Impact Of Complex Trauma

Complex trauma survivors can exhibit a wide range of behaviors and symptoms which may be frightening (i.e. suicidality, aggression) and/or puzzling (i.e. desiring connection while appearing to sabotage existing relationships). Youth often do not know why this happens and without the ability to articulate their experience, adults struggle to know how to help. Using the Structural Dissociation Model, this workshop will address the "why" and provide insights for intervening effectively. *Presented by: Maegan Heller, Victim Services Coordinator/Clinician - FLITE Center, Orlando, FL*

D-3 FASD & The Big 3: Raging, Lying & Stealing (Part 1 of 2)

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders are one of the first forms of trauma children can experience & we are seeing high rates of it within child welfare. Some common symptoms in children who have an FASD and/or have experienced trauma, are lying, stealing, and raging. We will discuss the neurobehavioral aspects of why these behaviors are

common and talk about concrete relational-based strategies that can help get a handle on these frustrating behaviors. *Presented by: Barb Clark, Director of Training -*

D-4 Connecting The Dots Between Substance Abuse And Human Trafficking

Substance use is one of the most influential techniques that human traffickers use to coerce, manipulate, and exploit their victims. Substances is commonly used to prey on the persons vulnerabilities that leads to the recruitment of labor and sex trafficking. The trafficker may recruit people by luring them with drugs and alcohol. The traffickers may target individuals with existing substance abuse issues to recruit into a trafficking situation.
